AC BATHS LEISURE POOL

THE AC BATHS' leisure pool and hydroslides have reopened, following after a 10 day closure for essential maintenance.

About a million litres of water was pumped out of the leisure pool to allow for the first major maintenance and closure at the AC Baths since its refurbishment in 2013.

Tiles around the bombing island and on the entry stairs have been replaced along with lining in the "water overflow" areas of the pool. Pipes and valves have also been repaired and areas inaccessible when the pool is full were inspected and cleaned.

Thanks to everyone for their patience while the work was carried out. Please be aware temperatures may be lower than usual for a day or two as the water reheats.



NEAR COMPLETION

THE UPGRADE TO the AC Baths private pools is now nearing completion after a few interruptions created by Covid-19 restrictions. The New Zealand-made pools have been lowered into their bases by crane and the final fit out of the new pools should see them up and running by mid-April.

The new pools will be larger and able to accommodate sports teams.

Facilities officer Laetitia Bowers said the interiors of the pool rooms had also been completely refurbished.

"The new pools are substantially larger than the previous pools, so groups have a bit more room to spread out," she



said. "This project has had its challenges due to difficulties in sourcing some materials, so it's great to see the upgrade nearing completion and we're looking forward to welcoming the community back to our thermal pools.'

TAUPO TOWN CENTRE TRANSFORMATION -PEOPLE WITH PASSION

SHANNAN BELL WILL be a familiar face to many in Taupō. Shannan was site manager on the upgrade to the Ruapehu and Tūwharetoa Streets intersection and helped show Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern around the work proposed for the town centre. Most people, however, will recognise her as the friendly face in the driving seat of some heavy machinery at our Horomatangi Street intersection upgrade.

It's all guite surprising for someone who trained for a very different career.

"I was studying accountancy when a customer in the café where I worked part-time and offered me a job driving a roller and it just clicked immediately," she said. "I've been working on machines for 11 years now - and have no plans to go back to being an accountant!"

Instead, Shannan moved to Taupō – partly because there was plenty of work here and partly because she was captivated by Taupo's beauty. She and her partner are now expecting their first child, so while she will be off the machines for a while, she has no intention of giving up doing what she loves. "I'll definitely be back. I just love doing my job and it's great to be a part of a project that is transforming the town. I love it here, it's a beautiful place and we're so lucky to live here."

"The work we're doing on the Taupō Town Centre Transformation is pretty challenging – everything has to be aligned to the millimetre - but it's also really rewarding when you walk away and see the finished project. We've had great feedback from everyone about the Horomatangi roundabout, and we're looking forward to the rest of the town centre transformation work. Ultimately I want to help more women do what I do. It's a great industry to be in and now is an amazing time to get involved, whether you're male or female!"
